Mid India Christian Mission

The Mid-India Christian Mission was started in 1970 by the late Dr. Vijai Lall. The first effort was to start a Christian School. With seventeen kids, a teacher and a rented house the work began. A phenomenal growth took place in the work and now it involves six families and several phases of work: Evangelism, Christian School; Printing; Bible College; Media Production facility; Eye/General Hospitals; Village Uplifts; Benevolence; and Christian Training Centers.



Vivert (pictured above with his family) was born and raised in Damoh, India. In 1991 he received his master's degree in Mathematics from the University of Sagar. Vivert, seeing the need for more Christian workers in India redirected his life plan. He joined the work of the mission full-time.

In order to better prepare himself, Vivert came to the States in January of 1992 to further his Bible education and receive his bachelor's degree from Atlanta Christian College. In 2002 he received his Doctor of Divinity from United Theological Seminary, Secunderabad.

Vivert's wife, Neelam Archana Dass, has a bachelor's degree in Biology from Ghasi-das University. They have two children,

Monica and Lae Stanley.

Now Vivert and Neelam are working in India. God has blessed their Church planting efforts. Their ministry has witnessed tremendous growth in the past years, spreading in four different states and Nepal. There are also training centers in three states.

Vivert also works alongside his father, Stanley Lalit Lall, who holds a master's degree and a Ph.D. and has studied at St. Louis Christian College. Vivert's mother, Dolly Lall, holds a Ph.D. in Hindi Literature and is a retired university professor. Vivert's older brother, Vivek, and his wife Angela, are graduates of Kentucky Christian University. They, too, are currently working in India full-time with the Mission.

FCC continues to support the Lall's and Mid-India Christian Mission.

We are excited and privileged to have Vivert as our special guest speaker on Sunday, June 12, during both morning worship services.

We all deal with it at some point in our lives. Most of us struggle with it all of our lives. Some of us are controlled by it. Some of us try to get more of it. Some of us don't think it's even a sin. MTV did a documentary on the 7 deadly sins at one point. When they came to PRIDE it turns out that their famous theologians, Queen Latifa, Ice Tea and others, thought that pride was a good thing. They believed you needed pride and you needed to be full of it. Really, they're full of it. **Jesus says in Luke 9:23-26, "Then he said to them all: "Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross daily and follow me. For whoever wants to save their life will lose it, but whoever loses their life for me will save it. What good is it for someone to gain the whole world, and yet lose or forfeit their very self? Whoever is ashamed of me and my words, the Son of Man will be ashamed of them when he comes in his glory and in the glory of the Father and of the holy angels."** I would venture to say that pride is something we need to be careful of. Pride is something we need to empty out of ourselves daily. As defined by our dictionary, pride is *"a high or inordinate opinion of one's own dignity, importance, merit, or superiority, whether as cherished in the mind or as displayed in bearing and conduct. It's a becoming or dignified sense of what is due to oneself."*

There's a main King in the Old Testament that really struggled with pride. He was put into his position as king not because he was from a royal family, but because the Israelites wanted to be like all the other nations and have a king rule them. So Saul was chosen because he was bigger than everyone else. He was chosen because he looked better than everyone else, so they assumed he would be a better king than anyone else. We never do that, do we? Pick our friends or our leaders based on their outward appearance?!! 1 Samuel 8-10 Saul becomes king. 1 Samuel 11-15 Saul has a downward spiral of his kingship controlled by pride until God rejects him as King and in the next chapter, 16, Samuel anoints David to become the next King of Israel.

Saul started spinning out of control when he started taking things into his own hands. He saw his victories and successful moments as something he alone did and stopped giving the proper credit to God. Saul started doing things his own way and stopped listening to God and His prophet Samuel. Saul was rebuked by Samuel, but he didn't change, he continued to spin out of control until ultimately God said NO MORE. Once David was anointed to be the next king and Saul found out that someone was going to replace him, he allow his pride to give birth to all kinds of other sin. He was constantly angry, always thinking someone was out to kill him, he threw tantrums, pity parties, and as his own son Jonathan befriended David, he began to hate his own son.

Pride destroyed Saul. Pride has the same effect today as it did thousands of years ago. If we are not careful, pride can destroy us. We live in a world where success is measured by how much you have accomplished. The apostle Paul says in **Philippians 3:4-11, "though I myself have reasons for such confidence. If someone else thinks they have reasons to put confidence in the flesh, I have more: circumcised on the eighth day, of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew of Hebrews; in regard to the law, a Pharisee; as for zeal, persecuting the church; as for righteousness based on the law, faultless. But whatever were gains to me I now consider loss for the sake of Christ. What is more, I consider everything a loss because of the surpassing worth of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord, for whose sake I have lost all things. I consider them garbage, that I may gain Christ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but that which is through faith in Christ—the righteousness that comes from God on the basis of faith. I want to know Christ—yes, to know the power of his resurrection and participation in his sufferings, becoming like him in his death, and so, somehow, attaining to the resurrection from the dead."** All that we do means nothing if it is not Christ working through us. All that we have is worthless if it is not for the cause of Christ. It is garbage. When we allow our pride to become what defines us and what controls us our lives become full of garbage. No matter how you dress it up, no matter how much Febreeze you put on it, it's still garbage!

Remember what we read earlier in Luke 9? (*Read it again*) We think that Jesus came to die for us, but really it's so much more. As Kyle Idleman says, *"Jesus came to kill you; for you to die to yourself and live for God."* We need to die to ourselves daily and allow God to fill us with His Spirit. We need to boast about God and what God is doing in and through us and around us. We need to give Him the glory and honor that He is due and not ourselves. It's going to take you waking up each morning and simply asking God to kill of your pride and fill you with Him. It means that you are going to stop living for yourself, stop living to make yourself look good, but rather do what it says in *Philippians 2:3-5*. If only Saul would have let go of his life and allowed God to control it. If only he would have listened to the prophet Samuel and heeded his warnings. But he didn't and his life ended up a destructive mess. Look to the news and its clear to see that prideful people will come crashing down at some point – Charlie Sheen – winning – not really!

When we live our lives sold out for Christ, he will see us through. Jesus gives us the promise that he will be with us always to the very end of the age. It's time for us all to not be ashamed of God getting the credit. We can't be ashamed of looking like a fool in the world's eye anymore. That's not encouragement to go out and be different because, well, we can't look like the world, so I'll look so off the map, people will know I'm not like them. The scriptures tell us how to look. You don't need to invent a new style, new words, or a new social atmosphere. It has been done for us, all we need to do is press on toward the goal that God has called us heavenward in Christ Jesus. We just need to look like Jesus. We need to love the unloved. That doesn't mean we tolerate their sin and allow their sin to be OK. Sin is still sin and we can't have any part of it and we cannot support it either. We need to simply love God's creation. We need to do what is right. We need to tell people about God and the place He is preparing for those who follow Him. If we spend our time looking like Jesus, we'll look less like our messed up selves and pride will have no hold on us!

I need to be constantly reminded that I am forgetful. And therefore, it is important to build constant reminders into my life. Things that I pass by every day, technology that repeats reminders and beeps at me, and habits and patterns that remind me to be faithful. God certainly understands this about us. He asked people to set up altars and monuments to commemorate what He had done. He instituted yearly festivals like Passover to remind His people of His goodness and provision. And Jesus set us on a pattern of remembrance with the Last Supper.

As I was reading through Deuteronomy 8 recently I was again reminded of our forgetfulness. All 20 verses serve as a warning and reminder to the people. You should read it, but for the sake of conversation, let me summarize. God tells his people to be careful to obey his commands. He reminds them who He is and what he has done for his people. And He warns them that when they inherit the land and become rich, eating whatever they want and living in houses that are nice, they will have a tendency to forget who gets the credit, who gave it to them in the first place. And if they forget? Destruction will come.

When you read the entire chapter, I wonder if you will see the same parallel that I see. To me, it sounds like America. It sounds like us. It sounds like me. We live a pretty good life, and that good life numbs us to God. We forget that He gives us the ability to be productive. We tend to look at our own hands for the provision placed before us. And we are in danger. We are in danger of destruction through our own forgetfulness and pride. And people who call themselves Christians are not immune.

So set up patterns of remembrance. Make worship and spiritual disciplines a priority. Don't schedule things on Sunday Mornings. Read God's Word every day. It's as easy and this: Remember God by obeying Him. It's also how we show our love for Him.

Now if I could just remember where I put my keys.
