Sermon on the Mount

The Sermon on the Mount (SoM) can be a very difficult passage to make application in our lives, but I find that application can be found if we understand its conclusion.

These words I speak to you are not incidental additions to your life, homeowner improvements to your standard of living. They are foundational words, words to build a life on. If you work these words into your life, you are like a smart carpenter who built his house on solid rock. Rain poured down, the river flooded, a tornado hit - but nothing moved that house. It was fixed to the rock. But if you just use my words in Bible studies and don't work them into your life, you are a stupid carpenter who built his house on the sandy beach. When a storm rolled in and the waves came up, it collapsed like a house of cards. - The Message

There is no doubt about the metaphors involved in the conclusion. The house is definitely a metaphor of our life, the stone is Jesus, and the storms are the storms of life. However, what really intrigues me is how the whole Sermon on the Mount is supposed to be interpreted. For many years I have heard it preached and taught that the sermon should always be interpreted in a literal fashion, but the scripture in question is filled with hyperbole, metaphors and idioms. How can a literal interpretation do justice to the words of Jesus?

For example, how many of us keep anger in check? How many of us never look at a woman or man in lust? Or how many of us are willing to invite Osama Bin Laden over for dinner? Come on really. How can these be literal in our everyday situation? So I began reading and found a great chapter in Yancey's "The Jesus I Never Knew." He talked about this same struggle, and he went back through church history looking for other interpretations. What he found was interesting.

"Thomas Aquinas divided Jesus teaching into Precepts and Counsels..." If I understand this correctly, Aquinas understood that some parts of the sermon were unattainable and should be considered advice from Jesus, but not law. So Aquinas divided the SoM into requirements and suggestions on how we should live. This to me seems a cop out of interpretation. He couldn't explain the drastic hyperboles used by Jesus, so he explained away the text. In my opinion he waters down the message.

"Martin Luther interpreted the Sermon on the Mount in light of Jesus' formula: "Give to Caesar what is Caesar's and to God what is God's." So Luther would argue the existence of the Christian's duality between two separate kingdoms. So a soldier could not concern himself with the SoM when fighting in battle, because at some level he was acting in the best interest of the earthly kingdom; and thus it would not reflect on his spiritual life. As Yancey points out, this interpretation cannot be valid, because of what history has taught us. Hitler and Germany believed this wholeheartedly and committed atrocities to mankind while keeping a clear conscious. This cannot be the will of God.

The Anabaptists, similar to my personal background, chose the more literal approach to the SoM. The problem is they were eventually wiped out by others because of their unwillingness to fight for their own protection. Also, they even admit that no Anabaptist has ever perfectly met the requirements set forth by the SoM.

Other interpretations are that of the Dispensationalists and Apocalyptists. Dispensationalists saw the SoM as being an OT scripture because it took place before the death of Christ, and as such they were not subject to its rules. Schweiters and the Apocalyptists saw the SoM as a set of rules for unusual times. Yancey speaks of this as "martial law." I agree with Yancey. These interpretations only explain away the validity of the SoM, and do nothing in the realm of understanding it.

I think there is a since in which there is a dual purpose to the SoM. Like Yancey, I see there is a place for lofty ideals, but the real message of the SoM is that we need Grace. The Sermon on the Mount brings each man to the conclusion that he/she is inadequate of the prize of Heaven. If we try and accomplish these goals on our own and not in the light of grace we are foolish men building upon sand. But if we trust in Jesus and put our faith upon the Rock, and accept his foundational teaching; we will weather the storms of life and find our home in Heaven.

My heart has been so full watching Jackson begin Kindergarten. I am so proud to be his Dad, and at the same time I am wondering if I have taught him enough to be a good example. I love seeing him grow to be independent, but at the same time I mourn a little for him not needing me as much as he used to. Even in a few short days it has gone from "Dad, walk me into the school." to "Dad, can you just drop me off at the curb?"

I wasn't prepared for everything that becoming a father would bring, but there are two major things that stick out from that list that have surprised me. The first is the tension of loving to see my kids reach milestones and being sad that they have moved past a certain "stage" at the same time. Loving to see them grow and be their own person, but losing some of the innocence and childlikeness in the same stroke. Part of it has to do with wishing that time would slow down a bit, but in a bigger, broader way it's more about knowing that each moment that God gives us, they move farther from me. I am not meaning to be overly dramatic here. It's a simple fact that the older they get, the more they learn, the less they need for me to help sustain their life. It is an ongoing, ever-growing, and sometimes almost ruthless separation. It may be easier to see with Mothers, who at one time were actually physically bound to their child, then after they become an adult they no longer live in the same house, or town, or even the same state or country.

The second item on my list that has caught me off guard is a spiritual irony, one that has been staring me in the face for a while now. There are so many things I learn about God by being a dad, so many parallels, but this one is the inverse. It is this, I want my children to grow and become their own person. I want them to learn to think for themselves and to take care of themselves and be responsible. As we grow in our relationship with our kids, we seek to make them need us less, but as we grow in relationship to God, He seeks to be everything we need. Always. Nothing held back. Complete and utter dependence. It is something I still, at times, struggle to learn.

As I seek to make my son and daughters independent, it is my calling as a father to make them completely dependent at the same time. Independent from me, and dependent on God the father of our Lord Jesus Christ. Only through total surrender is this possible. I hope I get it right and I will work to make it so.

LIVING DEEP

This fall's Sunday evening sermon series was prompted by my desire to teach a series that challenges Christ followers to "go deeper" in faith and knowledge of the Scripture.

With this in mind, I wanted to prepare a series that would be exegetically strong and focused on personal spiritual vitality. For a variety of reasons, 1 John seemed to fit the bill. The subject matter is simple and straightforward: truth (right doctrine), obedience (right living), and love (right relationships). The cyclical structure of the book invites deeper reflection on these themes.

One would think that such a series is strictly for the "mature" Christian – the person who has been a Christian for a long time and has a good grasp of the Scriptures. However, the letter's original purpose was to strengthen and assure "new" believers. So, whether you've been around Christ for a long time or you just met him, this series can speak to your faith and life.

The title "Living Deep" is to communicate that spiritual depth isn't simply about knowledge (a common misconception,) but about everyday life and relationships.

I hope you can join us each Sunday evening at 5:30 as we embark on this study.
